Lincolnia Auction Prices - 1914

In 1914 the collection of the late Major William H. Lambert of Philadelphia was sold at the Anderson Gallery by the Metropolitan Art Association, Madison Avenue at Fortieth Street, New York, N.Y. The sale was successful and the prices realized were considered extraordinarily high for that day.

Major Lambert, a veteran of the Civil War, prominent business man, writer, lecturer and collector died at his home in Philadelphia on June 12, 1912. His primary interests in the field of collecting were Abraham Lincoln, William M. Thackeray and General George H. Thomas (Civil War). For almost fifty years (shortly after the close of the Civil War) Major Lambert collected Lincolnia "having first been inspired to take up the pleasant pursuit by receiving a gift from his father of a copy of Dr. J. G. Holland's *Life of Lincoln*." By purchasing as a lot Andrew Boyd's collection, he was able to acquire a number of rare items that were not available to the other collectors of his day.

His collection of Thackerayana (1331 items) gave him a reputation on two continents as he possessed material (manuscripts, etc.) admitted to be unsurpassed.

His collection of Lincolnia (3145 items) and the Civil War (1331 items) was as complete as was possible to acquire in his period. In addition to his manuscripts, broadsides, photographs, sculpture, relics, medals and medallions, books and pamphlets, he had an extensive number of outstanding portraits of the Civil War President.

The five catalogues listing his collection for sale number 634 pages of descriptive material. They follow:

The Lincoln National Life Foundation has all five of the catalogues bound into one volume showing the prices that each item brought at the different auction sales. In the light of present day values some of the prices

seem utterly ridiculous. In fact, the reason for the compilation of this random selection of material for this issue of *Lincoln Lore* is to emphasize the low price which each item brought in the 1914 auction.

Part I of the Lambert sale consisted of the most important part of the Lincolnia. Part IV and Part V included the remainder of the collection with a great

deal of the listings devoted to medals, medallions and portraits. The twenty-one special features of the first sale as listed on page (8) of the catalogue are here given:

On the inside of the front cover Lincoln has written:—"The following extracts are taken from various speeches of mine delivered at various times and places, and I believe they contain the substance of all I have ever said about 'negro equality.' The first three are from my answer to Judge Douglas, Oct. 16, 1854—at Peoria."

The three newspaper clippings of the speeches follow, pasted down and numbered: On the next page Lincoln has written:—"The fourth extract is from a speech delivered June 26, 1857, at Springfield." The printed speech follows. On the next page there is another note which reads:—"The following marked 6, was brought in immediately after reading the first extract in this scrapbook, in the first joint meeting with Judge Douglas, Aug. 21, 1858 at Ottawa." The reverse has a note:—"The following marked 7 is from my speech at the fourth joint meeting, Sept. 18, 1858, at Charleston."

Following these clippings there is a long autograph letter to "Hon. J. N. Brown," dated Springfield, Oct. 18, 1858. This letter occupies 8 pages of the book and is signed. The remainder of the book is made up of clippings and pencil notes by Mr. Brown. 18mo, worn leather, in a new morocco slip-case. \$2250.

Daguerrotype Portrait of Lincoln, smooth shaven, showing the face in part profile to the left. Dressed in evening clothes, with wide turned-down collar. In a stamped leather case, with a gilt metal border. About 4 by 5 inches (two small defects on the face and neck). \$230.

Ferrotypes Portraits of Lincoln and Hamlin enclosed in a circular frame shaped like a coin. Gilded; and with the date 1860. Used during Lincoln's first campaign for the Presidency: pierced with a hole at the top. \$3.

Ferrotypes Portraits of Lincoln and Johnson enclosed in a thin metal circular frame, gilded and about an inch in diameter. Pierced with a hole at the top and made for use in Lincoln's second campaign for the Presidency. The portrait of Lincoln appears to have been taken from a painting. \$3.

Mourning Brooch of small size, containing a photograph of Lincoln surrounded by a six-pointed star of jet, apparently mounted and backed with gold. \$1.

Lock of Hair cut from Lincoln's head after he was shot. Enclosed in a 14 carat gold case, with a bevelled glass top. Size of box, 3 x 1½ x ¾ inches. \$330.

Sleeve Button worn by President Lincoln at Ford's Theatre the night of his assassination. It was broken by the surgeon in his hurry to reach the President's pulse. In two parts; the front, bearing a letter "L" on dark enamel, having been forced off. The back is of gold, with the two fasteners common at that period. In a sterling silver box, with plate glass cover. \$150.

Inkstand Used By Lincoln for many years in his office in Springfield, and which appeared as No. 113 in the catalogue of the Lincoln Memorial Collection. \$505. Office Chair used by Lincoln in his office in Springfield. Revolving arm-chair of rather crude design, and showing evidences of much use. A portrait of Lincoln has been set into the back at a comparatively recent date. This chair has been vouched for by Mr. Herndon as the chair used by Lincoln during his active partnership with him in Springfield. This was not a general office chair, but the one used by Lincoln habitually at his desk. \$265.

Cane presented to Abraham Lincoln by William O. Snyder. The wood appears to be oak or some other heavy variety: it has a heavy silver top, with deep engraving, and a ferrule of brass and iron. It shows the effect of considerable usage. \$435.

20. Surgeon Taft's Notebook of events at Lincoln's deathbed

Taft, Charles S. M.D. Note-Book kept by Surgeon Taft in 1865. The first 17 pages of the book contain an account of the events following the shooting of President Lincoln, as witnessed by the writer; the medical notes of his attendance of the President and the post-mortem examination. These notes are signed, with the following statement "Done at Washington, D.C., this the Fifteenth day of April, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five." Of the time of death, Taft writes: "The heart did not cease to beat until 22' 10" past 7; my hand was upon the President's heart and my eye upon the watch of the Surgeon-General who was standing by my side with his finger on the Carotid." The remainder of the book is made up of medical notes, addresses, and general observations. 12mo, leather; in a green morocco slip-case. \$180.
