- February 12. Born in Hardin County, now LaRue County, 1809 Kentucky.
- Family moved to Knob Creek 1811 farm.
- A brother, Thomas, born but 1812 died in infancy.
- 1815 Attended first school taught by Zachariah Riney.
- Attended school taught by 1816 Caleb Hazel. November. Family moved to
- 1816 Perry County, now Spencer County, Indiana.
- January. Shot a turkey with his father's gun. 1817
- October 5. Mother died of 1818 milk-sickness.
- 1819 December 2. Father married Sarah Johnston, a widow with three children.
- 1820 Attended school taught by Andrew Crawford.
- 1821 January 9. A step-sister, Elizabeth Johnston, married Dennis Hanks.
- 1822 Attended school taught by Sweeney.
- Parents joined Baptist Church. joined Pigeon Creek 1823
- 1824 Attended school taught by Azel W. Dorsey. 1825
- Worked at Taylor's Ferry, Anderson Creek.
- August 2. His sister, Sarah 1826 Lincoln, married Aaron Grigsby. 1826
- September 14. A step-sister, Matilda Johnston, married Squire Hall.
- January 20. His sister, Sarah Grigsby, died. April. Made first flatboat trip 1828
- 1828 to New Orleans.
- 1829 Served as clerk in country store.
- March 1. Lincoln, Hanks, and 1830 Hall families started for Illinois.
- 1831 Employed by Denton March. Offutt to build flatboat.
- Made second flatboat 1831 April. trip to New Orleans.
- July. Took up per residence in New Salem. 1831 permanent
- August 1. Cast first vote and served as clerk of election. 1831
- 1831 Engaged as clerk in Offutt's store. 1832
