## BIBLIOGRAPHY

The bibliographies presented in Lincoln Lore which have listed Lincoln literature published during 1930 show that forty-four books and pamphlets and sixty-three magazine articles have been tabulated besides a great number of newspaper articles, etc. Of course there were many items which were missed in compiling these lists.

There was no book published during the year which might be called an outstanding work. One life of Lincoln by a famous author which was expected to take its place among the famous studies of the Emancipator did not measure up to expectations.

# Current Events

On November 21 the Lincoln Memorial Highway Commissions repre-senting the states of Illinois, Indiana, and Kentucky, met at Indianapolis to discuss plans for the establishment of a memorial highway from Lincoln's cradle to his grave.

The state of Illinois on December 17, 1930, completed arrangements for taking over an eighteen acre tract of land on which the old Lincoln homestead was located. Thomas Lincoln lived on this farm for several years prior to his death. Sarah Bush Lincoln also lived there until her death some years later.

Improvements have been made at the Lincoln Birthplace Farm in Kentucky which have long been needed and which greatly beautify this historic place.

The Indiana Lincoln Union has announced the acquisition of more land for the Nancy Hanks Lincoln state park in southern Indiana.

Work continues on the Lincoln monument at Springfield and even now some plans are being made for the dedication program.
