A LINCOLN POLITICAL CALENDAR

In August 1831, Abraham Lincoln cast his first vote. This event might be called his introduction into politics as he immediately began to take more than a casual interest in the political activities of the state. On this one hundredth anniversary of his initial recognition of his franchise, it seems timely to trace the outstanding events in his political career which led up to his nomination for the presidency of the United States.

The addresses, which Lincoln made in the Illinois Legislature, and United States Congress, are not listed in this

August 1. Served as clerk of the election. Cast his first vote.

1832

March. Public announcement of his candidacy.

May 7. Appointed postmaster of New Salem, Illinois.

1834

January. Appointed as a deputy surveyor of Sangamon County. August. Elected as one of the four assemblymen from Sangamon County. 1836

August. Re-elected to Legislature December 5. Lincoln became Whig floor leader at opening session of General Assembly.
